István Németh (PhD 2001) deals with the composition of the burgher families of Košice and Sopron, the family networks and the phenomenon of early modern burgher stepfamilies. He has worked as an archivist for the National Archives of Hungary in Budapest since 1994, and has been Head of Department of the pre-1945 Governmental Organs since 2012. He is a member of the editorial board at a number of academic journals (Levéltári Közlemények, Urbs, Fons), and was a member of Archival Professional Board at the National Cultural Fund between 2005 and 2008. He was/is the leader of research projects 'The Role of the Elite in Early Modern Urban Leadership and the Social Network of Its Members' and 'The Political Culture of the Hungarian Estates (1526-1848)'. In addition, he participated in several other projects, e.g. 'Family and Social Historical Research Group of the National Archives of Hungary', 'Foreign Trade of Hungary in the 16th Century', 'Competency and Up-to-dateness in Hungary in the Pre-Modern Times', and 'The freemen in the free royal towns in Hungary between mid-18 and mid-19 centuries (A prosopographical database)'. He has been the recipient of the Prize of Ember Győző by the National Archives of Hungary (2005). His principal research interests include early modern urban history in Hungary, and economic and social history. He published a monograph (2004) and a number of articles and chapters in peer-reviewed international journals and anthologies on urban politics in early modern Hungary. He edited Archontology of town Kassa (2006), as well as the diary of a Sopron burgher (2014). He edited or contributed to various digitalised source publications.
